Along with the Student Government Association, the library is co-sponsoring Crafternoons at the Main Campus and Orange County Campus throughout the Spring 2020 semester.


We have already needle felted and made magnets and cards so far this year, and we still have some fun crafts coming up.

Library Instruction & Course/Assignment Resource Guides

Library instruction is available for all classes and for a variety of topics, including information literacy, effective search strategies in databases and on the internet, selecting college- and subject-appropriate resources, evaluating and understanding scholarly journal articles, citation assistance, and much more!

Instructors can request a library instruction session either in the downstairs Main Campus Library Computer Lab or in their classroom through the <u>Library Instruction</u> Request form under Library Forms. Note: We are no longer using the eform.

Students can request one-on-one research assistance sessions through <u>Book-a-Librarian</u> (though they are always welcome to just come into the library and ask questions as needed).
